Annual General Meeting

Notice is hereby given that the Annual General Meeting will take place at 11.00 on Saturday 25th February 2017 at Swannington Village Hall, Swannington, Leics LE67 8QL.

The committee would like to invite all those members attending the AGM to join them for lunch afterwards. It will be an informal affair, so bring your own lunch and join us for a chat.

In accordance with the Constitution and Rules, Jonathan Pattison and Eion Flint are required to stand down as committee members but both are eligible for re-election without nomination and they are both willing to stand again. Klaus Senkpiehl has decided to stand down from the committee, thus making one vacancy on the committee.

The Secretary and the Treasurer are required to stand down annually, but are eligible for re-election without nomination. Liz is willing to stand again, but Carla has decided to stand down as Treasurer, thus creating a vacancy for the role of Treasurer.

NATIONAL PET SHOW



The pet show was held at the NEC Birmingham on 5 and 6 November. Clubs are invited to have a breed stand very much along the lines at Crufts and Discover Dogs, London. This however is a more relaxed affair, with the dogs sharing floor space with a variety of pets, including snakes, spiders, parrots as well as cute furry animals. It certainly gave the dogs some entertainment as the miniature horses went by on their way to the ring.

We had dogs on the stand both days. We were there Sunday with Tyler, sharing with Lilly who brought along Carla and Klaus and Mirren, an eight month old Face Rase, supported by his owner Pauline. It's worth mentioning that for such a young dog Mirren's behaviour was impeccable.

The difference between this show and Discover Dogs was that here the public were looking at dogs not really breeds, at Crufts, for example many are comparing breeds for a life style or a particular sport they complete in.

National d'Elevage

The Nationale d'Elevage, organised by the RACP, (Réunion des Amateurs de Chiens Pyrénéens) is held every year in September in the Parc de Casino, Argelès-Gazost which is a pretty little town nestling in the foothills of the Pyrenees. This year it was held over the weekend of the 17th and 18th September and dogs representing the four Pyrenean breeds (Pyrenean Sheepdogs Long Haired and Face Rase, Pyrenean Mountain Dogs, Catalan Sheepdogs and the Pyrenean Mastiff) were present. Three hundred and one dogs were entered (a hundred and thirty two of which were Pyrenean Sheepdogs Long Haired) coming from sixteen different countries.

The show has evolved over the years into a festival of not only the Pyrenean dogs, but also of the local customs and food. The show takes place on the Sunday but there were many events to entertain and educate people on the Saturday. How to present your dog in the show ring with Agnès Audibert, proved to be very popular. Tests de Comportement and the CANT (to test a dogs herding aptitude) took place as well as agility demonstrations, a discussion on the various breeds and traditional local music and dancing. Normally a procession of dogs and owners from the Parc into the town takes place at 6.30 when the Preident of the RACP, the Maire of Argelès and a representative of the Tourist Board, welcome everyone. This is followed by wine and nibbles provided by the Tourist Board. However this year as the weather was somewhat inclement, the Maire decided that it would be unwise to have the parade and so the speeches and the refreshments were held in the park under the cover of the marquee.

Fortunately the weather on Sunday was dry but cool. The main focus was on the show rings but there were also many stalls selling local produce and there was traditional singing and dancing. The show rings were busy right up until lunchtime. After lunch, attention turns

to the Ring d'Honneur. A parade of all the exhibitors from countries outside France takes place with everyone waving the flag of their respective country as they walk round the ring. Sadly my husband and myself were the only ones to represent Great Britain this year. Our



five year old dog Geordi de l'Oustaou de Padel had been shown in Open Male class gaining an Excellent and our sixteen year old female Ribalette de l'Oustaou de Padel was also with us. The only other club member showing a dog was Marie-Anne Vecoutère with Ch Lorelei du Pic de Piolou coming 4th in the Champion Female class.

Next the Pairs, Couples and Groups of various breeders are judged. Then comes the serious business of first selecting Best of Breed of each type. Best Pyrenean Sheepdog (Long Haired) went to D'Estaing du Domaine des Genots and Best in Show went to a very handsome Pyrenean Mountain Dog from Sweden, Vi'Skaly's Mumin.

It is always well worth the effort of making the long journey to Argelès especially if you are an officianado of the Pyrenean Breeds particularly the Pyrenean Sheepdog (Long Haired). It is certainly a very informative and interesting weekend.

VET'S CORNER



Ear disease in your dog

Ear problems are a common condition that I see on a daily basis. When ears are causing irritation to a dog it is difficult to miss the symptoms! Head shaking/ rubbing, flapping the ears, scratching the head and tilting the head are common symptoms. You may also notice a malodorous smell from the affected ear or thick black wax.

Unlike humans who have one horizontal ear canal, dogs have a vertical and horizontal canal. The opening of the ear is high up the head; the vertical canal runs down the head followed by a sharp bend to the horizontal canal with the ear drum at the end. This anatomical difference does predispose dogs to getting ear disease, especially dogs with dangly ears like spaniels. This is because ear flap (pinna) blocks the opening which reduces ventilation so the canal becomes warm and humid allowing bugs like bacteria and yeast to grow.

There are many reasons for ear infections to develop such as foreign material (e.g. grass seeds) becoming stuck, ear mites, infections with bacteria and yeast or allergic disease. It is important that if you suspect your dog has an ear infection, regardless of if it has happened before that the ears are examined by a vet. Please do not use drops you may have been prescribed before; it may be a completely different problem, antibiotic drops once opened, go off quickly and you will most certainly be predisposing your dog to antibiotic resistance (something that unfortunately is now a problem I see often). Your vet will likely use an otoscope to examine the ear canal and check the ear drum. Direct examination will reveal any foreign material or mites, while a swab of the ear will check for infections with bacteria and yeast. Occasionally a blood vessel can burst in the ear due to excessive head flapping to cause a condition called an aural haematoma. This is not painful for your dog but can feel a bit heavy. Sometimes this needs to be surgically drained, but smaller haematomas will resolve providing treatment for the ear disease is carried out.

If your dog has chronic and recurrent ear infections, your vet may advise further testing and treatments to try and find a root cause. Culture and sensitivity can reveal resistant bacteria, examination and flushing of ear canals under an anaesthetic can help treatment become more effective and finding out if your dog suffers from allergies may prove the reason for the skin health to be compromised and susceptible to infection.

For healthy dogs that do not suffer from ear problems, regular ear cleaning is not necessary, however regularly checking the inside of the ears is recommended. For dogs that are prone to ear disease or that swim often it is recommended that you clean the ears once every 2 weeks to prevent a build of debris and wax. Gently plucking excessive hair from the ear canal can also aid in increasing ventilation. To clean the ears, use a cleaner recommended by your vet as these will likely have antibacterial and anti yeast properties whilst maintaining a pH that is appropriate for the ear canal. A small squirt of cleaning fluid followed by gentle massage down the side of the head should allow the cleaner to reach into the horizontal canal. This should be followed by removing any excessive fluid and wax using cotton wool from the opening of the ear.

I hope this has been informative and that you check your dogs' ears often! Pyreneans do have floppy ears and if yours roll in as much mud and muck as Henry does I wouldn't be surprised if a bit of ear cleaning is needed!

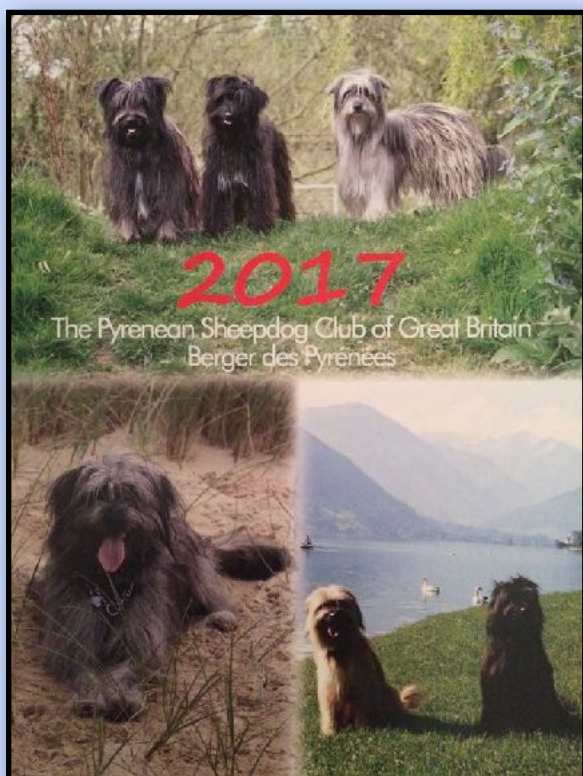
