Régionale d'Élevage at Grospierres



The Régionale d'Élevage, organised by Agnès and André Audibert, was held in the lovely grounds of the Château de Bournet, Grospierres, in the Ardèche area of France on Sunday 4th May.

The day before the show Jean-Bernard Moings (a member of the RACP committee) assisted by Agnès Audibert, gave a talk on the Breed Standard of the Pyrenean Sheepdog in France. The talk lasted for at least a couple of hours and required intense concentration on my part to follow and understand what was being said. There are many similarities between our standard and that of the French as our standard is based on that of the French. The main points which emerged from the talk and at times lively discussions, were that the Pyrenean Sheepdog is essentially a rustic, working dog and this must be reflected in the show ring. Any dog judged in the show ring must also be fit for the purpose for which it is bred. It was also thought that while many dogs with cadenettes are presented in the ring, these should not be used for hiding faults or an excuse for not grooming a dog.

Following the talk Agnès gave a short “master class” on how to present and move a dog in the show ring. This was followed by a meal, which was very well attended.

There was a good entry for the show and all four Pyrenean Breeds were represented. The judging took place in two rings on the Sunday morning. The judges were Mr Guido Massemello from Italy and Mr Jean-Bernard Moings.

After lunch, attention was turned to the Ring of Honour. Firstly the couples, pairs and groups entered by various breeders, were judged. Then dogs who had not necessarily been placed in their class but had been noted as having very good movement or expression were brought into the ring. A cup was presented to the dog considered to have the best movement and likewise the best expression. It was very interesting to see both these characteristics highlighted in this way. Next the first three dogs in their class of each breed competed against each other to find Best of Breed and then they competed to find Best in Show. The honours went to Griotte de l'Oustaou de Padel.

Our experience of CaniX- Heather and Henry

CaniX is all about running with your dog; in essence it's a bit like sled dogs- only your dog is attached to you, not the sled. All you need is a good fitting harness for him/her, a waist belt for you, a bungee line connecting you both and six legs!



I first discovered CaniX when Henry and I were at Crufts in 2013 after speaking with Diane Newton who did the sport with her Pyrenean sheepdog Tyler. I thought the idea of running with your dog sounded very fun and interesting- especially with such an active and bouncy breed!

In December 2013 I decided that I would try to raise money for charity and was eager to give CaniX a go- I managed to get all my equipment for Christmas, set a race date for April and then I jumped straight into training not really knowing what to expect!

I did not think Henry would quite understand the idea of the sport at first but I couldn't have been more wrong- on the first run we tried he set off at a million miles per hour straight ahead of me, pulling at the harness. He was in his element and loved every second.

Henry and I took every opportunity to train. We first just practiced straight lines to get the hang of the pulling action of the harness. We then tried some cross-country exercises which were more challenging- especially when he tried to pull me down wet and slippery hills. Needless to say I had a fair few bumps and bruises and

all the while Henry would impatiently wait for me to brush off the mud so we could carry on.

The charity run was drawing nearer so I decided to try an earlier CaniX event to meet everyone and get to grips with how the course is run. Henry and I woke up early and travelled to Cwmcarn forest in Newport. Everyone was very friendly and explained how the course is run- Diane and Sheila were there as familiar faces and after a chat I felt more at ease- however, I had heard through the grapevine that the course was very difficult. Diane warned me there was a very steep part with steps and advised me to walk up them rather than to try running. Henry basked in the environment with lots of barking dogs and soon became very excited- especially when he saw the CaniX gear coming out he knew exactly what we were doing. Every runner set off one by one and when it was our turn we set off with enthusiasm through the forest paths. Fifteen minutes into the course I started struggling, not being as fit as I would have liked but I kept going as fast as I could with Henry motivating me. I soon saw quite a steep bit with some steps so I recognised this as the time to have a breather and walk. We then picked the pace back up and I felt happy that we had done what I thought was the worst bit. Ten minutes later the course started to become steeper, and steeper and steeper! I remember one part when I had to literally pull myself up using a hand rail! For a moment I worried about Henry as we had never done anything like this and I was certainly struggling, but he was a star- taking the steep cliffs in his stride and jumping from rock to rock like a kangaroo! He helped pull me up the worst bits and eventually we crossed the finish line together (and were still running). Needless to say Henry slept all afternoon and I couldn't walk for days!

After that experience (which I may add was deemed the hardest CaniX event since the group began- typical for us to try that one first) we went straight back into training and really started to see and feel the effects.

April approached and we went to Pembrey Country Park in South Wales for the charity run with family and friends there for support. This time it was a mass start where everybody began at the start line together. Henry became so excited it was the first time I ever heard him howl and, when the whistle blew he shot from the start line pulling me as hard as he could through the course. The run was beautiful- full of forest, sand dunes and lakes. We both thoroughly enjoyed the run and finished the course in less than half an hour which we were very pleased with.



CaniX is a brilliant way to keep yourself fit and excellent exercise for active dogs- I have seen such an improvement in my own fitness and Henry's condition since starting. The best thing about it is to see how excited and happy Henry is when I pull out the equipment- it is a great sport you can enjoy together and I would encourage anyone who is considering giving it a go to take the plunge, because you won't regret it!

I am happy to say that we exceeded our target and raised £590 for the Motor neurone disease association. The just giving page is still open to see and read our story, and would be truly grateful for any additional donations.

CHAMPIONNAT DE FRANCE

This year we decided to combine a short holiday in France with the Championnat de France which was taking place at the Parc des Expositions in Angers. We stayed in Chinon in the Loire region, a very beautiful part of France. The weather was very hot reaching 33 degrees on the Friday evening and this sparked off a terrific thunderstorm on the Saturday morning and we arrived at the show in pouring rain with 3 very wet dogs. Luckily we had allowed plenty of time before the start of judging and were able to get them dry.

The atmosphere round our ring was very nice, the other exhibitors were friendly and there were some lovely dogs entered. Our Judge was M. Alain Pécoult, International judge and breed specialist also President of the R.A.C.P and the PSD Club of GB, it was a great honour to be judged by him and we were looking forward to his opinion of our dogs

First in the Ring were the Face Rase (smooth face) this gave Steve time to watch what the judge was wanting from the exhibits. It was good to see that the Judge moved the dogs many times round the ring something that doesn't happen enough here in the UK. Finally it was our turn and Oscar was graded Exc in Open Dog, Chilli Tres Bon in young class and then it was Friponne's turn in Open Bitch. There were ten present, she stood perfectly for the judge to go over her and when he moved her she really went so well and then all of the class was asked to move round the ring many times. Finally Friponne won her class, was graded Excellent and went on to be awarded the CACS, CACIB and Best of Breed. We were so very proud of her. M.Pécoult's critique of her was wonderful. To do so well in her country of origin under such a notable Judge was amazing.

About a dozen of us went for a celebratory drink and a bite to eat. We now had a long wait until it was time for the Group. The venue is very similar to the NEC with many halls , there were lots of trade stands and many different breeds that we

don't see here in the UK so it was interesting to spend some time looking at them. We were lucky to have Norbert (Friponne's breeder) there as we hadn't a clue on the procedure, finally it was time for the Group.

The music, lights and commentary and so many spectators all added to the atmosphere which was electric. The group judge Mr Hans Van Den Berg entered the Ring and all 40 BOBs of the 1st Group ran in and a commentary was given on each of them. Finally Mr Van Den Berg selected 6 to stay in the Ring and I was thrilled to see that Friponne was kept in. He then moved each one again and awarded Friponne Group 2 the winner was a beautiful Berger Blanc Suisse. This dog eventually went Best In Show, so Friponne was only beaten by the BIS.

A wonderful show and for Friponne to do so well in her country of origin is what dreams are made of.

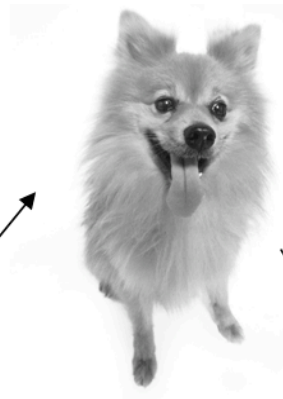
LUNGWORM

What is lungworm and how can my dog catch it?

Lungworm is a life-threatening parasitic worm known as *Angiostrongylus Vasorum* that can cause disease in dogs and foxes. The adults are about 2.5cm long and live in the heart and blood vessels supplying the lungs. Only the microscopic larvae are excreted in the dogs' faeces so the adult worms are never seen by even the most vigilant owner.

The infective larvae are carried by slugs, snails and frogs. Dogs can become infected by swallowing them or their slime. This is more common than you think as very small slugs and snails can be accidentally swallowed from playing with outside toys, drinking from outside water bowls or eating/ rummaging through grass. A report from the Royal Veterinary College identified that out of 18 confirmed lungworm cases, only 4 owners reported seeing their dog consume a slug or snail.

Slugs and snails are eaten by the dog. The larvae then grow into adults and migrate to the heart and pulmonary artery where they breed.



Eggs hatch in the lungs then the larvae are coughed up and swallowed to be excreted in the faeces.

The larvae are then eaten by slugs and snails. They grow in the slugs and snails to become infective to dogs and foxes.

Lungworm is most common in the southern parts of England and south Wales, however all UK dog owners should be aware that the number of cases are rising and are being reported in all parts of England and Scotland.

What are the signs of an infection?

A diagnosis of lungworm can be difficult as some dogs show no clinical signs of an infection. The most common symptoms are:

- Changes in behaviour (depression/ lethargy)
- Breathing problems (cough, difficulty getting a breath, tiring easily at exercise)
- Weight loss
- Vomiting/ inappetence
- Poor blood clotting (even minor cuts take longer to stop bleeding)
- Death

A vet can identify lungworm in a sample of faeces, however, this isn't 100% reliable as the lungworm larvae are not always present in every sample.

Treatment and prevention

An early treatment of uncomplicated cases can help a dog recover fully, but if left untreated or when signs are severe the parasite can cause serious disease and can be fatal in dogs. Even after an infection dogs are able to become re-infected and it is advisable to take preventative measures.

Some monthly worming products are licensed for the prevention of lungworm (advocate spot-on and milbemax tablet). It is advisable to speak to your own vet to determine an appropriate worming programme for your dog in relation to the area you live.

One of the biggest questions I get is in relation to the safety of advocate in collies, sheepdogs and related breeds. It is known that a very small number of these breeds have a higher sensitivity to the active drugs used and this should always be a consideration before using the product and after a discussion with your vet.

Studies have been performed with Advocate used on ivermectin-sensitive collies and it was shown that an application of five times higher than recommended for three consecutive treatments (every 28 days) showed no adverse effects. However, dogs that had accidental oral uptake (40% of the dose) did show severe neurological signs.

With this information and, as with any product- special care should be taken with these breeds to correctly administer the product, and, in particular accidental oral uptake (by that dog or another dog) should be avoided.

Other preventative measures include ensuring no toys, bones or chews are left outside and avoiding the use of outside water bowls.

In conclusion, Lungworm poses a serious threat to dogs, especially those living in Southern England and Wales. A good understanding of the disease and preventative measures will help keep your dogs safe against this parasite. This article should not be a substitute for speaking to your own vet that has met your dogs, but has hopefully helped to shed some light on a disease that worries dog owners.

Viewpoint

News and Views from the Breed Notes



Hi. My name is Eion Flint and along with my wife Shane we live up in the North Yorkshire Moors with our 5 PSD's and 2 Beardies. Our passion is for breeding, showing and herding with these unique little French herders. In addition to being a Committee member of the Club I write a weekly PSD Breed note for Dog World, however, I recognize that not everyone gets the dog papers and therefore going forward I hope to include a regular feature within the Club magazine that focuses on news and views that have featured in the Breed Notes as well as generally focusing on important news and issues that should be of interest to owners of PSDs.

As a start, set out below, is a breed note article that was published earlier this year in a June edition of Dog World. It was particularly pleasing that this article won me a "Breed Note Writer of the Week" award but more importantly it does raise some of the important issues facing the future of the breed here in the UK. As members of the Club it is recognized that our activities and involvement with our PSD's are both wide and varied. For some it is the serious stuff of breeding, exhibiting and commitment to producing the future population of PSD's here in the UK. For

others it is the passion for competitive activities such as agility, showing, obedience, working trials etc. For many it is just the pleasure in having one of these beautiful little dogs as active members of the family. As members of the Club one common thread for us all is surely our passion for this unique little herding breed. So whatever your focus we all have an important role in promoting and protecting the unique qualities of our breed. I would encourage you to really understand the "breed standard" and to support your club activities. We need your support in our breed health surveys, building our breed archives and participation in future club shows and fun days. Actively getting together, sharing knowledge and experiences makes for a great club but more importantly provides a sound foundation for nurturing the future of our rustic little French herder here in the UK.

Breed Note:

"Earlier this year I was asked to write a short article on the PSD as part of a special supplement feature on Rare Breeds in the Crufts edition of Dog World. I thought the feature was very good with inputs coming from a real cross section of different "Rare Breed" writers. What struck me at the time was just how similar the key messages from each of the contributors were even though we were talking about vastly different and unique breeds. Common themes were, how to strike the balance between promoting our breed whilst protecting the origins and characteristics that make our breeds unique, getting the KC and judges in particular to really understand the finer points of our breed standard and indeed for some to get a breed standard that truly aligns with the standard of their breeds country of origin. Additional themes included general frustration with the lack of CC status when top honours are available at shows on the continent, how to increase numbers within the breed without over-popularising these unique dogs with the obvious risk that they get into the wrong hands, and generally how to raise quality of stock and exhibits here in the UK particularly when compared to stock in country of origin.

These themes and issues really are at the heart of the challenges facing owners of PSDs here in the UK. In my own article I did acknowledge that over the last 25 years or so the UK PSD Breed Club had done a great job in getting the breed established and recognised with the KC and as well as providing a good focal point for all owners of PSD's both in terms of being a source of information and expertise as well as organising activities for members. For me personally I think the challenge is about what comes next. How are we going to lift the breed here in the UK to the next level? How do we tackle some of the issues highlighted above? There is no doubt that the UK Breed Club has a major role to play in setting out the vision for the breed and to champion the heritage, nuances and finer points of our breed with the KC, breeders and owners alike so that we really can promote and raise the quality of our stock here in the UK. For my part having recently joined the UK Breed Club Committee I look forward to making my contribution to this journey.

One final point that I think is worth raising relates to a point of view that seems to circulate throughout our UK PSD community and that relates to the question of "Showing your Dog". The debate seems to be around "you are either for it or against it". Whilst I understand the debate at a personal level, as we all have a choice as to the activities we enjoy with our dogs but it is important that we do not trivialise this debate. Showing and exhibiting dogs has its roots in breeders wanting to produce excellent specimens and have their conformation and temperament assessed by experienced judges against agreed breed standards. This is right at the heart of the origins of the KC itself which started out life as "breed fanciers" club.. If we do not have individuals willing to champion the breed through exhibition, particularly breeders passionate about establishing breed type, willing to go to the expense of bringing excellent blood stock into the UK then I would not hold out much future for our breed. Sure I understand why some individuals do not enjoy

the competitive element of being in the show ring but lets not forget that breeding, exhibiting and conformation assessment are the very foundation for building a strong breed.

I am very conscious that breed note articles can easily de-generate into a listing of show results and achievements and therefore I make no apologies for raising some of the bigger issues facing the PSD here in the UK. If there are any PSD owners out there with views on any of the above points or anything else for that matter and want to share them then please get in touch and I will do my best to reflect your thoughts in future editions of the breed notes."

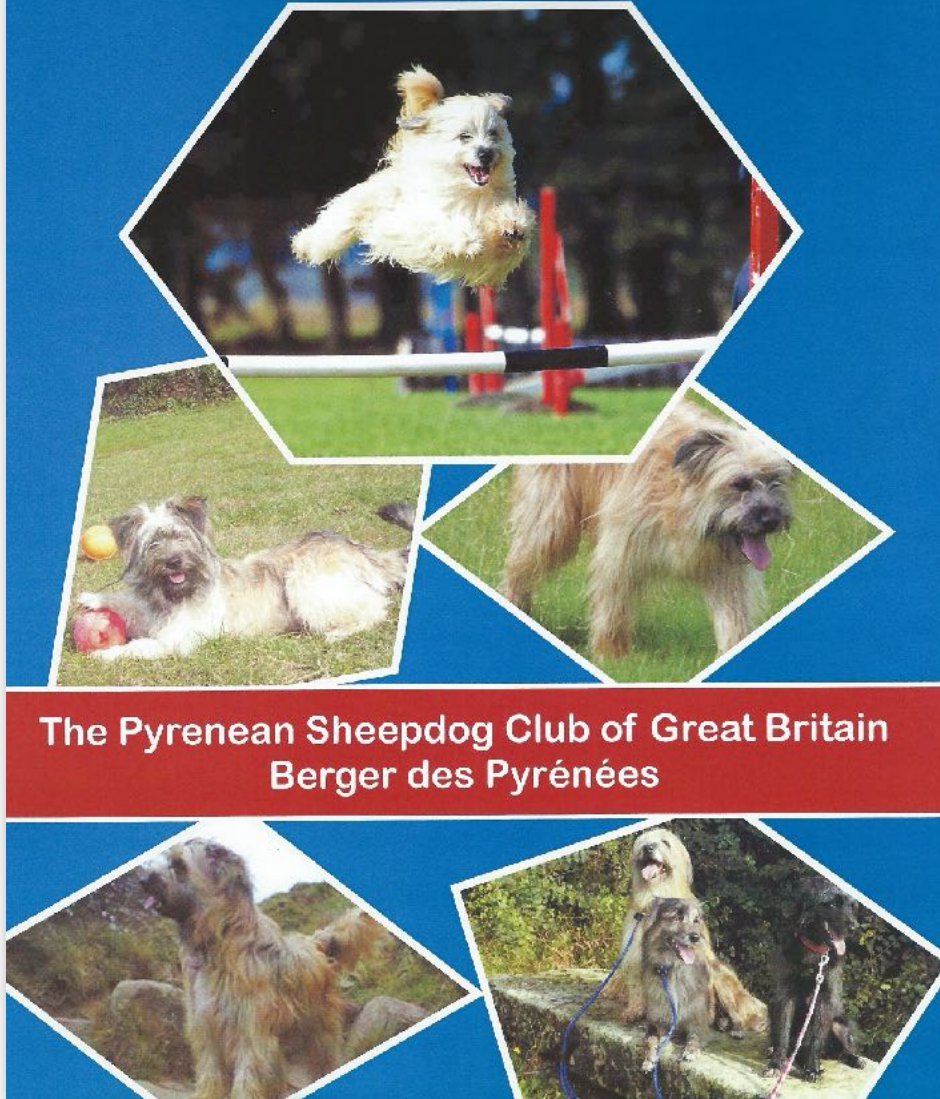
